The first newsletter from April 2012 titled Sante et Espoir (Health and Hope) met with unprecedented positive response from our readership of international supporters. Our staff in Guinea felt rejuvenated and empowered to know so many friends and associates were supporting them. We had achieved our ambitious objective to complete the roof on our 4,200 square feet hospital building before the rainy season started, and painted the historic Anglican Church inside and out to be rainy season. used as a community center.

been sustainability of programs and projects to imbue health and hope in the impoverished catchment area of Dominghia and its environs. About 15,000 people are touched by the work of Le Groupe Lyceum in one way or another as Dominghia continues to become an icon of rural development in West Africa. Our focus has been on finding ways to complete the hospital, design water catchment systems, and explore solar panel systems for much-

needed electrical power. In spite of the tropical rainy season and it now being the Holy Month of Ramadan for the mostly Muslim population, work has advanced commensurate with limited funding.

Aggressive work is underway to complete waste water disposal systems and start the inside finishing of the hospital. Our objective is to raise enough money to complete the hospital in the next six months before facing another

A decision to focus our resources was Our mantra for the last six months has the closing of our small office in Conakry, moving our management facility to the Noreen and Ryan Home in Dominghia. This meant ensuring we could get adequate Internet coverage on site at Dominghia. The current system is still dial-up and slow speed, but technology has finally come to Dominghia! Imagine! When we started our work in Guinea almost ten years ago there was **no** communication – not even cell phones.

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## **BUILDING A CENTER OF ESPOIR**

Starting with a blank page; starting with a piece of neglected land on the Rio Pongo River delta; starting with a small derelict unused church; starting with the ruins of a foundation; and selecting carefully a staff of seven local Guineans to be empowered with a mission was the genesis. Today there is a thriving center for community development at Dominghia. Fruit trees and gardens are flourishing, the little historic Anglican Church is drawing interest in the community and with tourists. The *Noreen and Ryan Home* is completed to house staff and overnight visitors, and the new small hospital is being completed. Every night the "lights are on" at Dominghia. Our three medical staff are now using part of the *Noreen and Ryan Home* as a temporary clinic and dispensary, and will move to the adjacent hospital as soon as they can.

Miraculously, your very kind donations have funded all of this to date. The deserted piece of land has become a vibrant community asset. Now we are in need of enough money to complete the hospital and training center to offer better medical intervention and the training of volunteer village health care workers as the first line of defence for good health – particularly women and children. We have estimated the completion cost to be \$25,000. The hospital has ten rooms to complete and furnish. Could either corporate sponsors or groups "adopt" one room and donate



\$2,500 per room with donor plaques for acknowledgement? These rooms include wards, reception, office, examining rooms, birthing room, dispensary and laboratory.


